NEW THIS YEAR – SUMMER PROGRAMME AWAY DAYS!

We are planning a variety of outings during the summer; the first to be organised is a visit to the **Heysham Nuclear Power Station** on **Tuesday, 22 July.** We will be travelling by coach, leaving Skipton Bus Station at 8.00 am and returning by about 4.30 pm. The excursion includes a stop for lunch in Morecambe. The cost will be between £15 and £20 and is non-refundable.

The deadline for applications for this trip is Monday, 17 February 2025. No payment is required until you have a confirmed place. The visit is limited to 30 participants, which will be allocated on a first come, first served basis. If the visit

is over-subscribed, it may be possible to organise a trip on another date.

Essential information

- You will need to provide your date of birth, nationality and home address on the application form which will be provided once your place is confirmed.
- Non-British applicants are required to provide additional information (to be advised).
- You must bring either a passport or photographic driving licence with you on the day.
- You will need to give emergency contact details.
- Although there are lifts in the buildings, all visitors must be able to negotiate up to 200 steps in the event of an emergency evacuation.
 Temperatures inside the building can get very high.
- Any health issues or disabilities must be shared with the Visitor Centre prior to the visit for a confidential one-to-one discussion about how any needs may be met.


The timeline is as follows:

The venues are booked centrally by our Venue Secretary. All invoices are paid centrally by the Treasurer. (Currently 20 weeks per year are invoiced to the u3a)

COMMUNICATION

The Beacon system provides access to send group emails, enabling the Group Leader to contact all group members via one email. WhatsApp is becoming an easier method of group communication. The member must give their permission to be added to the Whatsapp group (Data Protection).

So, -if anyone is considering or would like more information on running a group for our u3a, please contact me (or any committee member) for a chat. It is totally due to the commitment and enthusiasm of our Group Leaders that Craven u3a is a success.

Stories of Scientists Group – not too late to join!

The title sounds a bit techy, but the real purpose of the group is discover about the life behind the scientist, and yes there is some science at times.

Our group meets at Carleton Village Hall, starting on 8 January 25, from 10am – 12pm, for 10 weeks. The upcoming presentations are an eclectic mix ranging from Joseph Lister, The Lunar Society to Women in Science.

Although most of the scientists profiled are men, I'm indebted to Margaret



Goode who has unashamedly showcased women, eg Ada Lovelace, a mantle I'm trying to continue. She is regarded as the first computer programmer long before modern computers were invented. Her notes on Charles Babbage's proposed analytical engine are considered to be the very first computer algorithm.

It's a matter of history that science appears to be a male dominated field. However, scratch the surface and you find that women have made important contributions to science and technology.

Who had ever heard of Katherine Johnson before the film *Hidden Figures* profiled her story and achievements. Her calculations of orbital mechanics at NASA were critical to sending the first Americans into space, despite having to work in a heavily segregated environment. Or Margaret Hamilton, who was the director of MIT Software Engineering Division Instrumentation Lab, which developed the on-board flight software for NASA's Apollo programme.
