## **Musical Theatre – A History**

Do you enjoy stage musicals? If so then a new course starting in October on Monday afternoons (fortnightly) might be the course for you.

From early beginnings to the 2020s we will explore the development of musical theatre, taking a look at some of the great composers, from Gilbert and Sullivan, through Irving Berlin, Cole Porter and George Gershwin to the so called Golden Age of Rodgers and Hammerstein and Lerner and Lowe and will move on through composers such as Lionel Bart, Stephen Sondheim, Jerry Herman and many others to the 21st century with Alan Boubil and Claude-Michel Schönberg, Lloyd Webber and Lin Manuel Miranda. We will look at iconic choreographers like Jerome Robbins and Bob Fosse and key producers and directors such as Harold Prince and Cameron Mackintosh, considering the changes in technology, subject matter, form and audience appeal over the last 150 years.

Extensive use will be made of video clips from performances of well loved shows and will also introduce you to some less well known but equally significant and enjoyable

productions.

It is also hoped to include some audience requests for extracts from particular musicals if they are not already included in the programme and are available.

## **U3A Walking group - Red Squirrel Walk**

Our walk on 6 May was to visit the Red Squirrel sanctuary in Widdale valley, near to Hawes. I had led this walk a few times and it is always slightly different as wildlife is not predictable. This particular day was very interesting.

Widdale Wood sits in the bigger Snaizeholme valley. Two years ago the Woodland Trust had raised £3.5 million to buy the 560 hectares valley and they have started their ambitious project to create 290 acres of new mixed woodland. It will become the largest woodland in the Yorkshire Dales. They have already re-vegetated bare peat areas and re-profiled eroded areas. One of their aims is to create a haven for red squirrel and black grouse. Watch this space!

In pleasant sunshine we set off walking to the Squirrel Feeding area. There are notices asking you not to feed them as the National Park controls their diet. It took us about 45 minutes to get there. We started drinking our coffees and the squirrels appeared. They started by running up to the feeder, grabbing some food and then for the next half hour we were entertained by two or three squirrels chasing each up and around the tall trees at high speed. They then leaped onto another tree and again running down around the tree, all at high speed. They would then change trees and it would all start again. We postulated that as it was spring it was one or two males chasing a female. I subsequently spoke to the National Park Ecologist who is involved with the squirrels. He said they were either performing a mating ritual or they were protecting their territories, which overlap near the feeder station. Whatever, I said; it was very entertaining.

Their hind legs have a special flexible joint meaning their feet can turn backwards, which was demonstrated as they ran down at high speed. Too fast to get a good photo but here is one I didn't take!



We had to leave them eventually, and continued our walk up above the wood giving us extended views of the Snaizeholme valley. We found a tranquil spot for lunch next to a quiet stream. We walked out to the cars and on to Hawes Creamery to have our fruit cake with Wensleydale cheese and a cuppa.

# Sharing and Repairing at Skipton's First Ever Repair Café

Members passing through Skipton the other week may have noticed the buzz of activity around vacant St Andrew's Church on Newmarket Street. The site now hosts <u>Skipton Repair Café</u> on the last Saturday of every month, organised by volunteer group Share Skipton out of their popular Library of Things across the road.

The free July event will be on the 26<sup>th</sup>, 10am-1pm again at St Andrew's. June's repair café brought together over 100 residents to share practical skills and help mend each other's belongings, which many of us wouldn't have the confidence or equipment to attempt alone. Items given a second chance included broken lamps and electricals, dulled kitchen knives, worn-through clothing and leather handbags, glasses, jewellery, and children's toys.

And there's a reason it says 'café' in the name: even if you didn't bring anything to repair, it was a great opportunity to chat over a cup of tea and watch local experts



and retired professionals work their magic. There was even a volunteer dispensing biodegradable cleaning liquid refills made in Silsden. If there's anything you're adept at mending or you just want to lend a hand somehow, they were so friendly and I'm sure would love to hear from you.



For anyone not familiar with the 'Library of <u>Things</u>', it's an extensive community-built collection of items that wouldn't make sense for everyone to buy individually: for example, a carpet cleaner that'd spend 364 days of the year in a cupboard, or folding beds for when the grandkids occasionally stay over. Craven U3A members may also find borrowing from Share Skipton to be a cost-effective way of exploring new hobbies when deciding which groups to join: they carry hiking poles, sewing machines, gardening/DIY tools, indoor games, music gear, and more. ## **Birdwatching Group**

Many apologies to Jacqui who sent me this article at the end of March and I mistakenly omitted it from the newsletter, but hopefully it will still serve to showcase the group's activities and what new members can hope to experience next year – Ed.

Official birding season nears end as birds migrate back to U.K.

The final several sessions for our 80+ members are taking place. Last Monday about 40 of us braved chilly winds to visit St Aidans, south of Leeds, where we saw over 30 species including the stunning black-necked as well as great –crested grebes. Another highlight were goldeneyes among a really strong range of ducks including shelducks (the largest) and teal (the smallest). After several hours we continued to Low Ings, abutting Fairburn Ings where good numbers of whooper swans were gathered and doing impressive flypasts. Little and great egrets were seen and we rounded off the day with the main site and a good variety of woodland birds including beautiful bullfinches. Well worth the journey and lots packed in!

The last indoor meeting welcomed Ian Court from the Yorkshire Dales Authority who discussed birds in the park with particular reference to the Curlew and Peregrine Projects. Our area has such an abundance of interesting and beautiful birds and the expertise of many experienced members of the group mean we learn a lot from one another and spot far more than we would flying solo, if you'll pardon the pun.

We are continuing last year's extension of activities beyond the official season by having a Dawn Chorus walk from Barden Bridge on 8 April and a residential trip to the East coast in May. These should give ample opportunity to see migrants such as spotted flycatchers and blackcaps on the Strid and fabulous seabirds at RSPB Bempton Cliffs. Puffins are a delight but my personal favourite remains the gannet. We are hoping to take in Blacktoft Sands this year to see migrants on the 'Migration Superhighway'. 11 May is World Bird Migration Day.

We have room for another 20 members next year and the indoor meetings and outdoor trips provide related pleasures and information. Thank goodness the recent oil tanker crash didn't result in huge damage to our beautiful sea birds...it was another reminder of how we should protect and value them.
